8 Energy Efficiency Tips for Homeowners Going South for Winter >>>

1) Give a spare house key to a neighbor or friend. Even though it may be unnecessary, it's always a good thing to have someone you trust check over your home to make sure it's ok and everything is secure.



- 2) Have your furnace and heating system thoroughly inspected. The one thing you don't want to happen is your furnace to fail when you're nearly 1,000 miles away.
- **3) Program your thermostat to 55°F.** There's no reason to heat your home when nobody's there, however, you also don't want your home to freeze. Setting your thermostat to 55°F will prevent just that. You can close curtains and shades to help keep rooms warm. You'll also want to set the humidity to a low setting to keep the air dry, preventing condensation problems.
- **4) Turn water heater to "off" or "vacation."** Why pay for hot water when nobody's home?
- 5) Turn off the water supply. Unless you have house plants that

need watering while you're away, it's a good idea to turn off the main water valve and drain *some* of the water in the lines. The idea is that in the event your furnace fails, this will prevent your pipes from freezing and bursting.

- **6) Only plug in those things you want to leave running.** If you're going to be gone all winter, you'll want to clean out your refrigerator and turn it off. Unplug your water softener, water treatment systems, and (if you rely on one) your well pump. If you have a sump pump, you'll definitely want to leave that on and ready to work. You'll want to unplug any home electronics such as TVs, home theater equipment, printers, gadget chargers, computers, and other energy zombies. If you are using a smart thermostat with a network connection, remember to leave your network "on".
- **7) Put some lights on timer switches.** Automatic lighting is an excellent way to deter intruders from your home.
- **8) Plug or close your dryer vent.** This will help eliminate drafts and possibly prevent rodents from climbing into the dryer venting and setting up house. Tape a note to the dryer to remind you to unblock the vent when you return.

Top Winter Energy Saving Tips>>>

- ⇒ When you are home and awake, set your thermostat <u>as low as comfortable</u>. Some recommend **68°F or lower** in the winter. When you are asleep or out of the house, lower the setting by several degrees. Use a programmable thermostat to automatically adjust the temperature in your home.
- ⇒ Cover drafty windows with a heavy duty, clear plastic sheet on the inside of window frames during winter months.
- ⇒ Set your water heater to 120°F and drain your water heater annually.
- ⇒ Wash clothes in cold water, and wash only full loads.
- ⇒ Use your dishwasher at full capacity, and air dry dishes instead of using the dishwasher's drying cycle.
- ⇒ Switch to **compact fluorescent light bulbs**. Energy-saving CFLs are available for a variety of fixtures. They provide high quality light and smart technology, plus they use less energy and last longer than incandescent bulbs. For light closest to an incandescent bulb, choose CFLs marked "warm white."
- ⇒ Set **refrigerator temperature** between 37° and 40°F, and your freezer at 0°F.
- ⇒ Unplug old refrigerators in garages or basements that might be used as storage, but are inefficient and not fully utilized.
- ⇒ **Unplug appliances and electronics** when not in use. Plug home electronics, such as TVs, DVD players and computers into power strips and turn off the power strips when the equipment is not in use.
- ⇒ Improve your home's heating and cooling systems by cleaning or **replacing furnace filters** and scheduling **routine system maintenance** to help air flow through the system more efficiently.
